## Introduction to Complex Analysis

Problem 1: The equation $z^{3}=27 i$ has three complex solutions, the three roots of $27 i$. For each of these roots, find their real and imaginary part. In the Argand plane, i.e., the complex plane, draw a picture that shows these three roots.
(25 points)

Problem 2: If $z=\left(\ln 2, \frac{7 \pi}{6}\right)=\ln 2+\frac{7 \pi}{6} i$, compute explicitly the complex number $e^{z}$ and find its real and imaginary parts. Simplify your answer so that no exponentials, logarithms, or trigonometric functions appear in the answer.
(15 points)

Problem 3: Find the domain of

$$
f(z)=\frac{1}{z^{2}+6 z-i z-6 i}
$$

and find explicitly the real and imaginary parts of $f$ that are determined by the equation

$$
f(z)=u(x, y)+i v(x, y)
$$

(cf. page 34 of the textbook).
(25 points)
Problem 4: Consider the maps

$$
f(z)=\frac{z-1}{z+1} \quad \text { and } \quad g(z)=\frac{1+z}{1-z}
$$

1. Find the domain of both $f$ and $g$.
2. Show that $f$ maps the domain of $f$ to the domain of $g$ and vice versa. (5 points)
3. Show that $g(f(z))=z$ and $f(g(z))=z$ whenever these expressions are defined. Determine where they are defined.
(5 points)
4. Find the image of the imaginary axis under the map $f$.
(Hint: Do the second and the third part simultaneously.)
